## **7. ORDINANCES AND RESOLUTIONS**

A. Ordinance No. 4-26: First Reading: An Ordinance Adopting a First Amended Budget and Providing for the Supplemental Appropriation of Money for the Various Funds, Departments, Offices and Agencies of the City of Greenwood Village, Colorado for the 2026 Fiscal Year (Barnacle) (2026-74)

Deputy City Manager Shawn Cordsen explained the Police Department was requesting approximately \$20,000 to replace outdated fingerprinting equipment. He noted the Parks, Trails, and Recreation and Public Works Departments requested a carryover of unspent 2025 funds for Village Greens Park, fleet vehicles, and Capital Improvement Projects (CIP).

Mayor Lantz noted the CIP carryover was approximately the same from year to year. Deputy City Manager Cordsen noted the amount has increased as prices have risen and that budgeting for CIP was done a year ago.

Mayor Lantz asked for clarification regarding the fleet carryover. Director of Public Works Jeremy Hanak explained that a large portion of the carryover was due to the timing of purchasing/receiving plow trucks and police vehicles. He noted that these vehicles require additional equipment to be fully outfitted before they were released for service. This installation could take up to a year. He noted the cost for a standard police vehicle was approximately \$65,000.

Councilmember Wiesner asked for clarification regarding the \$1.4 million in savings. Deputy City Manager Cordsen noted the majority of the savings were from Public Works and Parks, Trails, and Recreation departments' closeout of projects.

**B. Resolution No. 13-26: A Resolution Regarding the Colorado Wildfire Resiliency Code (Schneiderman) (2026-86)**

Community Development Director Derek Holcomb noted the City conducted ground-truthing analysis of 41 properties identified by the State as an increased risk of wildfire. Staff found that no properties were at increased wildfire risk. He noted the resolution states the City did not intend to adopt the Colorado Wildfire Resiliency Code. He stated South Metro Fire Rescue (SMFR) supported the City's findings and decision not to adopt the code.

Dear Greenwood City Council Members,

My name is Jody Walles and I own a home in Cherry Creek South, the community that abuts Cherry Creek High School and the field on Dayton.

I am writing to you to document my concerns, which hopefully I will be presenting at the meeting tonight 4/6/26.

My concerns are as follows:

1. Provide a portable toilet unit at Tommy Davis Park on Orchard near Yosemite.
  - It is surprising to me that a park with the volume of attendance and diversity of people does not have a restroom accessible immediately nearby.
  - My family (including my daughter and her children) uses this park 3-4 times per week, in all seasons. I have observed that this park is widely used by families, caregivers with children, mothers with children, fathers with children, grandparents with grandchildren, elderly people, teenagers, children of all ages, dog walkers, joggers, over age 50+ groups, local businesspeople on break, basketball players of all ages, to name just a few! The Huntington Swim Club has a restroom, but this is not available for park visitors. There is also a permanent restroom at Silo Park up the block, added there more recently at what I understand and appreciate was at considerable expense. The Silo restrooms are NOT an option for most of the people who have to use a restroom at Tommy Davis. Think of a mom with little kids who are riding their trikes and bikes or roller blading, parents with multiple age children, grandparents with their grandchildren or other elderly people who may not have the continence strength of younger people to walk uphill the long block to Silo. They would need to gather all the children they brought to use the restroom at Silo Park This takes time and energy and then they still have to get to Silo Park. I find it improbable that any of these Tommy Davis Park visitors profiled here who need to use a restroom would get to Silo Park restroom “in time”.
  - The City of Greenwood Village invests heavily and takes enormous pride in its park system. I don’t know of any GV park this size that I’ve visited that does not

have an accessible restroom, either permanent or portable. Even the newer park up the bike path from Tommy Davis has a portable toilet in the parking lot.

- I am asking City Council to do the right thing and provide a solution to this issue, so that Tommy Davis Park can take its place as a truly full service park for all users.

2. Enforcement of kids on electric bicycles in neighborhoods and on sidewalks, in particular, on Bellevue Ave between DTC and Dayton.

- I recognize that this band of Bellevue can be a speeding and traffic nightmare. Many good solutions have already been implemented, including pull out lanes for drivers entering from side streets, photo cameras at Bellevue and Dayton, crosswalk passage and blinking signage at Beeler and Bellevue crosswalk.
- There is a new player in town and that is the electric bicycle. I've seen the articles in the GV Newsletter for the laws regarding these bikes, however the problem of kids riding in the middle of the road on Bellevue and (silently) passing vehicles on the road during rush hour traffic is dangerous, illegal and contrary to the Greenwood Village vision of safe roads and neighborhoods.
- My husband has witnessed a band of riders racing up the middle of Bellevue past cars, both during prime traffic hours and non-prime time. In the non-prime hours, they are doing wheelies and other fast riding. Since they are silent, this can be startling and dangerous for drivers. He has seen this on westbound Yosemite to DTC, as well as between Yosemite to Dayton, both directions.
- I have seen a band of riders (not sure if they were the same "band" each time) in my own community's streets (Cherry Creek Village South), racing and doing wheelies and tricks. I have stood in various parts of the street and basically stared them down with other neighbors, but this isn't the best or final solution.
- I'd like the City Council to further investigate what can be done to enforce our safety laws surrounding these types of riding behaviors. What can citizens in the GV community do to help, dissuade, enforce safety laws for the children in our neighborhood who play on the street?

3. Dayton and Bellevue Ave Intersection STILL a Pedestrian and Cyclist Hazard

- Northbound Dayton left hand turners onto westbound Bellevue is a clear and present danger to pedestrians and cyclists. Real pedestrians and cyclists have been hit at this intersection in this one lane space. I personally witnessed someone get hit one night, albeit the driver was determined to be on drugs.

- Actual incidents of pedestrians being hit, not to mention the near misses that don't get recorded, speak to the high risk when crossing Belleview on the west side of Dayton. Those "at risk" people are our children from Belleview Elementary School, Cherry Creek Middle School, Cherry Creek High School, adults walking for their health, Moms riding bikes with their kids, pedestrians, runners and cyclists from the Cherry Creek Reservoir and bike trails, you, me, our families and friends. This is a KNOWN high-risk intersection by GV government and police, there are even photo cameras installed at great expense.
- There can be no delay dealing with this issue. There is only MORE cell phone use, MORE texting while driving and MORE increased driving distractions. (For example, Is it really a good idea to let young girls wearing practically nothing dance and jump around on the Hope Church corner to raise money for cheerleading or Pom? I think this could qualify for distracting drivers. It's distracting to me, and I am just a woman pedestrian.). This problem will NOT solve itself. This is a real risk, real people are getting hurt, and there is real responsibility to brainstorm to resolve it, even if it is an inconvenience to the driving population during high traffic, school and pedestrian windows.
- One solution a person presented to me was if there was a red turn arrow to stop cars turning when the walk sign is activated for pedestrians. Currently, there is green turn arrow only, where pedestrians know not to walk. However, once the green turn arrow goes off, the car can make a turn when the driver determines it is "safe". This is the problem. There are many cars making unsafe turns when pedestrians and cyclists are present. Is it possible that a red no left turn arrow can be installed and timed for prime time pedestrian and cyclist traffic? For instance, school arrival and dismissal times, commuting windows, any other special events or identified high volume time. It seems there is a real need to tell drivers YOU CAN'T TURN NOW BECAUSE YOU COULD INJURE OR KILL SOMEONE.
- Yes, I realize that this will back up northbound and southbound traffic during high volume time. I am not addressing that right now. I am addressing the need for the GV City Council to be relentless about the safety of real people in this intersection NOW, not wait for a tragic accident to happen, G-d forbid. We are so worried about the traffic and a longer waiting time during what are essentially very narrow time windows along Dayton and Belleview and their intersection. Personally, I'd rather manage my driving expectations than see some sort of memorial fake flower tribute on the traffic signal at Hope Church's corner for someone who didn't quite make it across the street.
