Annual Discussion of Potential Capital Improvement Program (CIP) Projects

Executive Summary:

Annually, the Parks, Trails and Recreation (PTR) Commission recommends priorities to the City Council in reference to the Capital Improvement Program (CIP) for the design, development, acquisition, operation, and maintenance of recreation areas, natural space, and facilities as directed in the PTR Commission bylaws.

Project suggestions from PTR Commissioners, community members, and staff will be presented and discussed. A final list will be developed for recommendation to City Council during the Regular Meeting following this Study Session.

Discussion

Staff suggests the following items for inclusion in the recommended 2027 - 2031 CIP Projects List. Aerials of the project locations have been attached to facilitate visiting the sites prior to the meeting if so desired.

Orchard Road Undercrossing Repairs

The pedestrian undercrossing at Orchard Road, connecting Tommy Davis Park and Orchard Hills Park, has experienced some settling and heaving at the north end when exiting the box. The project would remove and replace the displaced concrete to improve aesthetics and safety.

Irrigation Controller Upgrade

The City's irrigation system consists of 113 controllers throughout the parks and streetscapes. The 18 park locations maintained by in-house staff are all on "smart" controllers, which allow programming to be monitored and adjusted remotely through central control. However, only a select few of the 95 streetscape controllers, which are maintained by a contractor, have this capability. This, at times, leads to uncertainties and unexpectedly high water bills. With the ever-increasing sensitivity to water use and the need to be a good steward of resources, replacing these controllers would enable better monitoring and control.

Silo Park Entrance Landscaping

Improvements to the entrance landscaping at Silo Park to improve aesthetics.

Tommy Davis Park Landscaping

Improvements to the planting beds in Tommy Davis Park, primarily on the west side near the ballfield.

Castlewood Park Landscaping

Improvements to the landscaping at Castlewood Park, including the replacement of the keystone blocks and the adjacent mulch bed at the entrance.

Westlands Park Landscaping

Improvements to the landscaping beds throughout Westlands Park, including necessary retaining walls to shore up steep slopes to the north of the park entry, and remodeling of the bed north of the pickleball courts.

Westlands Park Ponds Concrete Inlets

The concrete inlet structures at the top of the two primary ponds at Westlands Park have deteriorated and warrant replacement. It is proposed for design in 2027 and construction in 2029.

Westlands Northern Pond Bank Renovations

The northernmost pond at Westlands Park is surrounded by Russian Olive trees and a chain link fence. The proposed project would explore designs in 2027 with construction in 2029, improving the banks of the pond and transforming the area from a restricted area to a park amenity.

Westlands Park Playground Concrete Retaining Walls

This initial phase would include structural inspection of the concrete retaining walls around the playground area at Westlands Park. Future phases would be programmed to make necessary repairs and replacements.

Skatepark Renovation

Minor modification to the original portion of the Carson Park skatepark to improve user experience and safety.

Orchard Rd Streetscape - University Blvd to Long Ln

Improvements to landscaping on the north side of Orchard Rd to include cobble, mulch, and plantings.

Bellevue Ave Streetscape - Washington St to University Blvd

The cobble strip along the south curb line has become unsightly with sediment. In some locations, it is a 3-foot width that may be better served with a concrete "splash apron" like what exists on the medians. In other locations, more extensive replacement of the cobble and plantings are necessary. Design is proposed for 2027 and construction in 2029.

Sundance Hills Playground Equipment Replacement

The existing playground was installed in 1995 and is due for replacement. A public process will help identify the right equipment for this smaller neighborhood park.

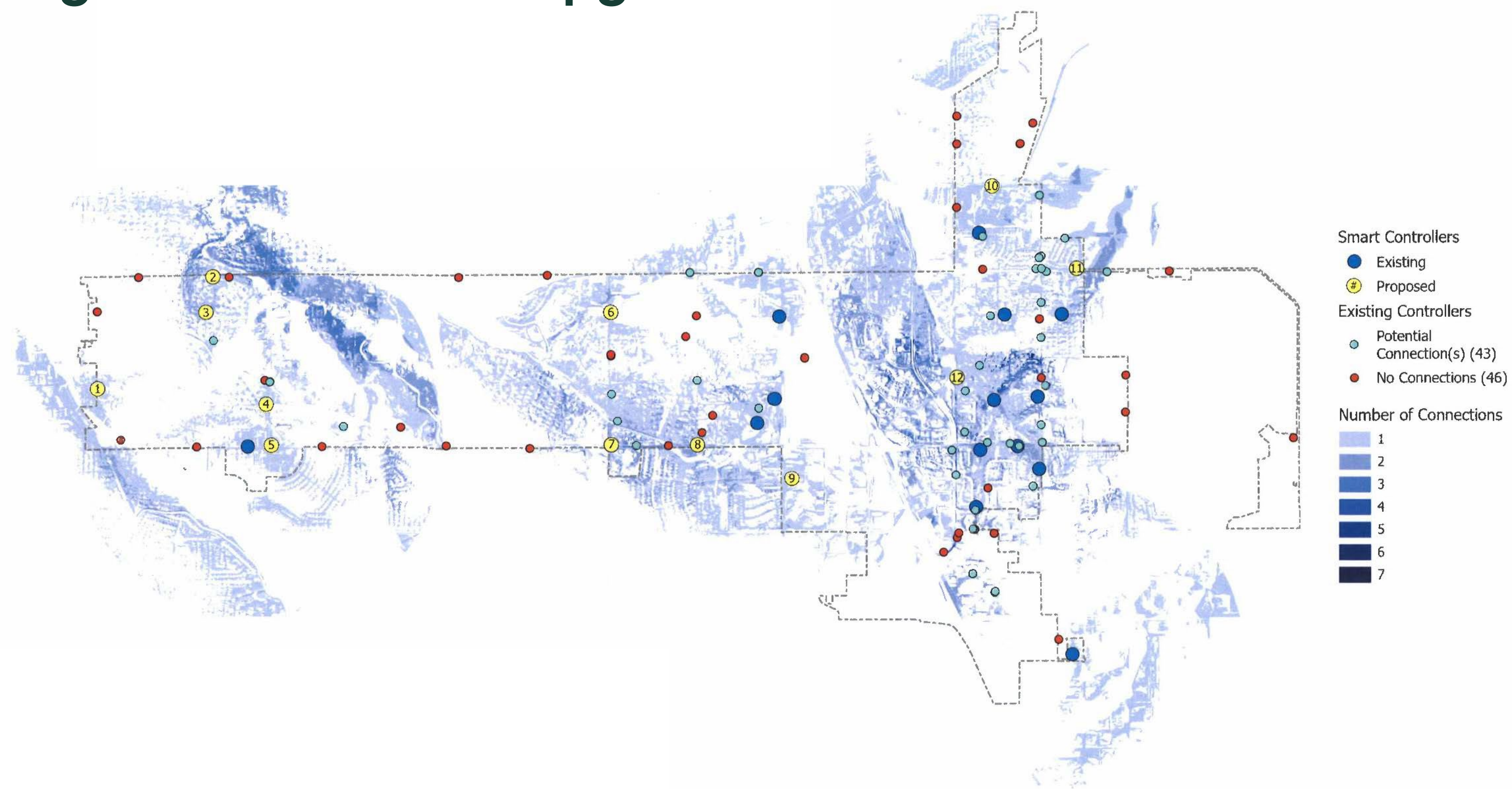

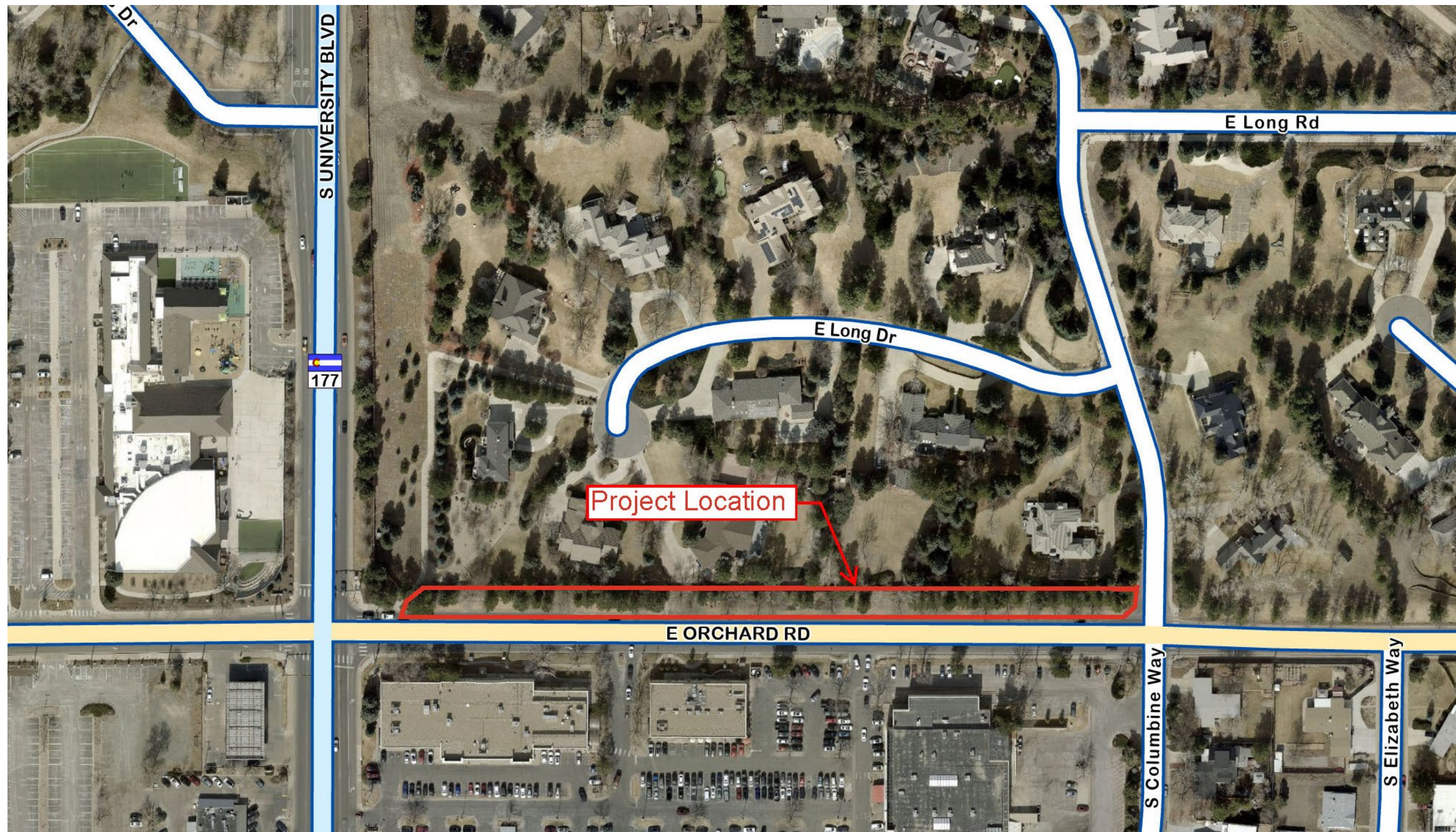

STUDY SESSION

A. Update on City Council Ordinance on E-Motorcycle Regulations (2026-33)

Director Suzanne Moore provided an update on the regulations governing e-bikes, e-motorcycles, and e-scooters, as outlined in the City's municipal code, adopted from the State Model Traffic Code, to support enforcement. Our City's Attorney also presented this at the city council meeting on February 2, 2026. These laws and safety guidelines were previously published in the January 2026 City newsletter to educate residents on speed limits and vehicle classifications. The speed limit on all trails and paths within Greenwood Village is 15 miles per hour. The Village Greens Mountain Bike Course is for mountain bikes only. Additional signage has been installed to reinforce compliance, and public education efforts are ongoing. The signs include the Police Department's non-emergency phone number (303-773-2525) for reporting violations. Individuals who do not comply may be issued a citation.

- *E-motorcycles and e-dirt bikes are allowed on streets, but not permitted on sidewalks, trails, paths, or open space. Requires a driver's license, vehicle registration, license plate, and insurance.*
- *Low-power e-scooters are allowed on streets, but not permitted on sidewalks, trails, paths, or open space. Requires a driver's license, vehicle registration with a sticker, and insurance.*
- *Class 1 and Class 2 e-bikes are permitted on sidewalks, trails, streets, and bike lanes.*
- *Class 3 e-bikes are permitted on streets but not on sidewalks, trails, paths, or bike lanes.*
- *Lightweight e-scooters/skateboards (like Lime) are permitted on sidewalks, trails, paths, streets, and bike lanes.*
- *Toy vehicles are not allowed on streets, sidewalks, trails, paths, or bike lanes.*

Commissioners discussed ongoing enforcement challenges, particularly in identifying vehicle types and monitoring speed, as well as the importance of continued public education, including informing schools.

B. Arapamap Overview (2026-34)

Director Suzanne Moore gave an overview of Arapamap and how to view parcel boundaries and ownership information.

5. PUBLIC COMMENT

There was no public comment.

6. PROJECT UPDATES

Recent increased coyote activity was discussed. Residents are encouraged to report concerns to the non-emergency police phone number 303-773-2525.

A. HLC Irrigation Project (2026-32)

The contractor for Phase 1 has been mobilized, and irrigation installation has begun. This will utilize the Marjorie Prairie well as the water source, covering the area from Belleview Avenue to Orchard Road. Phase 2, on the west side, has held a design kickoff meeting. The same consultant group from Phase 1 is evaluating options to convey water to the west area. Two potential tap locations are being assessed to determine if they would better serve this section, and coordination with Denver Water is ongoing to determine the cost of the taps. The well water is free (the city owns the water rights), but

there are costs for electricity to pump the water. A cost analysis is underway, including consideration of adding a booster pump. The team is also reviewing whether storage tanks are needed before boosting or if direct boosting is feasible.

Additionally, there is an existing three-quarter-inch tap at Green Oaks Playground that we plan to extend to serve the area from Green Oaks Drive to Orchard Road. Another consideration is whether Denver Water will allow potable water to be used for irrigation in the future. The city owns three wells—Silo, Village Greens, and Marjorie Prairie—while two additional wells, Tommy Davis and Westlands, are operated by the Metro District; all draw from the Arapahoe aquifer. Commissioner Allen Adinoff asked about the possibility of siphoning water beneath Little Dry Creek, as with the High Line Canal. Director Suzanne Moore responded that there would be significant pressure losses when pushing water down and back up. The current approach is to run the irrigation lines alongside the bridges, since the irrigation lines are taken down for the winter. Currently, a 3-inch HDPE pipe is being used.

Commissioner Allen Adinoff also asked whether water could be run from Greenwood Pines to the High Line Canal. Director Suzanne Moore explained that this is not feasible, as the Greenwood Pines system barely serves its own park and already has a booster pump.

B. Greenwood Pines Irrigation (2026-35)

Irrigation work in Greenwood Pines is scheduled to begin later this month.

C. Belleview Trail East (2026-36)

We will be removing the trail in the spring and updating the landscaping, as the area where it leads to Cherry Creek State Park is not an official entrance.

D. Carson Park Restroom (2026-37)

Restroom construction is currently in progress, with anticipated completion in mid-summer. Pavilion construction is pending grant funding; if approved, work is expected to begin in the fall with completion targeted at around Memorial Day. Construction activities may impact the event access points for Fall Fest and the Mayor's Lighting.

E. Westlands Water Feature (2026-38)

The water feature is currently under construction and remains on schedule to open by Memorial Day.

F. Arapahoe Station Pickleball Courts (2026-39)

The project is going through the approval process, with all grant funding expected to be received by August. Construction is anticipated to begin in August. The multi-use commercial component must

still proceed through the Planning and Zoning Commission and City Council for approval, and the property will need to be replatted. Project completion is anticipated to allow use by spring 2027.

Chair Jim Sidinger asked about the possibility of including a dog park, as Vice Chair Jean Greos had previously mentioned. Director Suzanne Moore stated that the project would need to return to City Council for approval and complete initial phases before a dog park could be considered; it is not included in the current phase.

G. Westlands Park Playground Replacement (2026-40)

A public input meeting is scheduled for March 25 at 6:00 p.m. at Westlands Park. Concept boards outlining various possibilities will be available, and additional feedback will be collected. An additional outreach opportunity may be held at the April 2 Egg Hunt event. Improvements under consideration include renovation of the tot lot and the central playground.

7. UPCOMING MEETINGS

Once there are agenda items, Director Suzanne Moore will notify the Commissioners and poll them on their availability.

8. ADJOURNMENT

A motion was made by Commissioner Lisa Piantanida, seconded by Vice Chair Jean Greos, to Approve Adjournment. The motion carried by unanimous voice vote.
